Rituxan is a biologic therapy that is indicated to treat:

• moderately to severely active rheumatoid arthritis (RA) and currently taking methotrexate

What Is Rituxan?

Rituxan (rituximab) is a prescription medication administered for patients via IV infusion.

How Rituxan Works

Rituxan works by targeting immune cells called B-cells. Overactive B-cells are believed to play a role in the symptoms and joint damage of rheumatoid arthritis.

What Is Rituxan Used For?

Doctors order rituximab to treat:

• moderately to severely active rheumatoid arthritis (RA) and currently taking methotrexate

Rituxan Infusion Dosage and Administration

Patients receive rituximab intravenously. Treatment time for a Rituxan infusion usually lasts 4-6 hours for the first treatment and 2-3 hours for the following treatments.

Dosage and Frequency

Rituxan is administered in "courses". Each course consists of two 1-gram infusions given two weeks apart. The courses are separated by 6 months for a total of 4 infusions per year.

Administering Rituxan via IV Infusion

- 1. The nurse prepares the patient's arm by using rubbing alcohol to sterilize the location that is being used to insert the IV needle.
- 2. Following needle insertion, the IV line is held in place with tape.
- 3. The nurse attaches the patient's IV line to the line coming down from the bag of medication.

Every half-an-hour, the patient's nurse takes his or her vitals.

Rituxan Infusion Side Effects

As with all medications, side effects are possible.

Common side effects of Rituxan include:

- Infusion-related reactions
- Infections
- Body aches
- Tiredness
- Nausea
- Low white and red blood cell counts
- Swelling
- Diarrhea
- Muscle spasms

Additional more serious side effects include:

- Tumor lysis syndrome
- Serious infections
- Heart problems
- Kidney problems
- Stomach and serious bowel problems
- Severe skin and mouth reactions

How To Prepare for a Rituxan Infusion

It is essential that patients inform their physician if they currently have, or have had, any of the conditions listed below:

- A severe reaction to Rituxan or a rituximab product
- A history of heart problems, irregular heartbeat, or chest pain
- Lung or kidney problems
- A serious or recurring infection
- A weakened immune system
- Any other medical conditions
- Are currently taking any medications, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements

Before treatment, patients should get a good night's sleep. In addition, they need to drink an adequate amount of fluid and eat a meal before their Rituxan IV infusion treatment.

During treatment with Rituxan, patients need to avoid receiving live vaccines.
